

Exciting New Bylaw ... Coming Soon to LBS!

If you are like most members, your eyes glaze over the minute a Board member mentions anything pertaining to our 501c3 status. I always had that reaction until I became a member of the Board and felt I should now pay attention.

As our society grows, we have an increase in financial activity and the need for a complete understanding of our 501c3 status seems to have grown. In as few words as possible, 501c3 status is given to nonprofit organizations. We qualify because our society is educational in nature.

In order to ensure that LBS is in complete compliance with federal regulations for 501c3 organiza-

tions, a group of Board members comprised of **Helen Dahms**, **Michele De'Brabant**, **Julie Miller**, and **Amy Smith** investigated the federal guidelines and studied the original LBS application.

We found that we have everything in order with one minor exception. There is an addition to our bylaws mandated by the government; this addition was previously unpublished and must be voted on by members.

Members will be receiving a formal notification of this addition, and a vote will be taken at an upcoming membership business meeting. The details and wording can wait; I don't want any eyes to glaze over yet!

Wit, Wisdom & Wizardry of Christi Friesen



Christi Friesen firmly believes that "the world is a better place for there being more interesting things in it." And Christi — noted polymer clay artist and extraordinary teacher — is responsible for plenty of those "interesting things."

Christi presented August's program to delighted LBS members, and two clay seminars to a lucky group of beady students the previous weekend.

Christi's meeting topic was "Designing Jewelry: Color, Movement, & Balance," liberally illustrated with examples of her work. Christi describes her poly clay and mixed media jewelry as "a sculptural canvas yet you get to wear it." Her work liberally incorporates precious stones, pearls, fibers and beads. She claims — modestly but incorrectly — that her "only claim to fame in beading is to do a crimp."

Students at her weekend classes enthusiastically turned out lily ponds, sprites, moths, flowers, wrap vessels, steampunk creatures, ocean scenes, wall pieces and even jewelry. They happily showed off their creations at Table Talk to widespread acclaim from other members.

"I'm so impressed with myself" was a common comment during the seminars as Christi's lively instructions and examples







led students to create artworks they'd thought were beyond their capabilities. All this while having an absolutely wonderful time!

Christi offers free downloadable projects and lots of inspiration on her website, www.cforiginals.com. She also notes that the Fire Mountain Gems website (www.firemountaingems.com) offers free, very detailed instructions for her Peacock Pizzazz necklace.

She advises beaders to study "all artworks, not just your medium or one artist. If you focus on one artist, you tend to absorb their style."

She adds that, "It's perfectly okay to just do art — beading or whatever — for your own enjoyment." — by Carol Haiar

Exhibiting at a German Bead Show

"It was ah-mazing," says Maggie Roschyk of being part of the first ever Beaders Best Perlenkunst-Messe bead show in Hamburg, Germany this August.

The show was well-organized, and the crowds were very good. "My booth was right in front, and every time I looked up the first day more people were coming in the door," Maggie recalls.

Maggie had one table on which she displayed some of her bigger pieces, including those that had been on the cover of *Bead&Button* magazine. At another table she conducted 30-minute classes in such basic stitches as square and ndeble.

"The students were wonderful," she says. Though she taught in English, there was no language barrier as those standing to watch the lessons translated when necessary. "It was a blast," Maggie adds. Many of the students were professional women who worked long hours and wanted to learn to bead for relaxation.

A highlight of the show was a bead jewelry fashion show organized like a couture runway show. Models in black sheath dresses and black heels modeled gorgeous, show-stopping jewelry while the crowd took pictures and videotaped.

The bead show was sponsored by the German bead magazine *Perlen Poesie*; the show promoters invited




Maggie to participate. "It's about time Germany had a bead magazine," Maggie says, "because many of our stitches originated in that part of the world. And it's a gorgeous magazine."

She felt her world get a little smaller while trading business cards and making German Facebook friends. But on the other hand, Maggie feels personally enlarged. "I feel a kinship" with those she met, she says. "Those folks are crazy about beads and so am I."

Please don't be shy! Catch the newsletter coordinator at the next meeting or contact her via our website. We want a newsletter that reflects everyone in our Society.






Wiring Round the Bend
